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Team Edwards expands testing of commercial drones

The diminutive, but increasingly useful, quadcopter was put to another challenge June 2 when it flew over a small building near the Edwards flightline to give members of 412th Civil Engineer Group an idea of its capabilities as a building inspection tool.

With some assistance by the 412th CEG, the Emerging Technologies Combined Test Force here flew a series of sUAS – small unmanned aerial system – flights over the building to evaluate the feasibility of the sUAS to do roof inspections for CE, and to evaluate the performance of the sUAS quadcopters themselves. The first flight was done by a machine that was previously tested for aircraft inspections, and was followed by a flight test of a recently acquired and mostly untested sUAS.

"While roof inspections are being accomplished using these and other similar systems, our unique issue is the proximity to the flightline environment," said Maj. Danny Riley, the director of the ETCTF. "It's a continuation of the other feasibility studies we have been doing over the last several months to demonstrate the capabilities for USAF use

A second quadcopter, with more advanced instrumentation and a higher-quality camera system was tested next.

As the drones passed over the building, Michael Warren, an engineer technician with the 412th CEG, verbally guided pilot Riley to the features on the roof of the building they would inspect.

"Some advantages this new and innovating technology could bring to CE is it can be used for locations that are hard or unsafe for humans to get access," Warren said. "Also the video and pictures can be saved as work evidence."

The flights over the buildings were in addition to similar projects performed earlier in the week.

"The first (project) was to gather updated imagery and video detail of the old Raptor compound for the Test Management Group, to supply to the contractor

Outgoing 461st CC selected for astronaut training

Lt. Col. Raja Chari has been selected by NASA to join the 2017 Astronaut Candidate Class. He will report for duty this August.

Chari relinquishes command of the 461st Flight Test Squadron June 9 where he oversaw developmental testing of the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter for the past couple of years. Simultaneously, he served as director of the F-35 Integrated Test Force.

Chari will leave Edwards AFB as a colonel select. He has accumulated more than 2,000 hours of flight time in the F-35, F-15, F-16, and F-18 including F-15E combat missions in Operation Iraqi Freedom and deployments in support of the Korean peninsula.

The Iowa native graduated from the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1999 with bachelor's degrees in astronautical engineering and engineering science. He continued on to earn a master's degree in

aeronautics and astronautics from Massachusetts Institute of Technology and graduated from the U.S. Naval Test Pilot School.

Chari is one of 12 new astronauts introduced on Wednesday who will train for missions into Earth's orbit and into deep space.

The seven men and five women comprise the 22nd class of American space-flight trainees since 1959. The group is the largest NASA has selected in almost two decades a NASA release said.

The 12 new candidates include six military officers, three scientists, two medical doctors, a lead engineer at SpaceX and a NASA research pilot.

Chari will report for duty in August to begin two years of training as an Astronaut Candidate. Upon completion, he will be assigned technical duties in the Astronaut Office while he awaits a flight assignment, according to NASA.

Road construction delayed

Construction on South Lancaster Blvd. is delayed due to unforeseen conditions on the base course layers below the old pavement.

The purpose of this project is to replace failed pavement on 2.1 miles of South Lancaster Blvd., from the South Gate to the base perimeter. Once the contractor removed the old pavement, they found material that is not suitable for compaction to create a proper base for the new pavement.

While an estimated completion date hasn't been set, the 412th Civil Engineer Group, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and the construction contractor are working as quickly as possible to develop an affordable solution that will provide Edwards a safe and structurally sound road that will last several years. who is "re-building" it," Riley said. We also acquired imagery required to build high-resolution 2-D and 3-D maps of the area, both for the contractor to potentially use for their planning, but also to demonstrate the capability."

The second project was requested by the Army Corps of Engineers and was very similar to the Raptor compound.

"(The Army Corps of Engineers is) overseeing contractors working to remove debris on South Base, and wants regular (every four to six weeks) imagery to evaluate the progress of the work." Riley said. "We took high overhead shots, as well as the same type of imagery to build 3-D maps, which will hopefully allow volumetric estimates that will help their data collection."

Riley said his CTF will the roof inspection video and the 3-D reconstructions and figure out any lessons learned before flying the third roof CE requested.

"Then we'll make recommendations on what works well and what else may be needed," he said. "We already know that we need a thermal/infrared camera to do the inspections thoroughly."

Schaefer stresses perseverance, passion to students

Brig. Gen. Carl Schaefer, 412th Test Wing commander, had the unique honor of speaking at the first ever eighth grade promotion ceremony for Fulton and Alsbury Academy of Arts and Engineering in Lancaster, California.

The newly opened school held its first promotion ceremony next door in New Vista Middle School's gymnasium, which was filled to capacity with family, friends and students.

Schaefer served as the VIP guest speaker for the ceremony. He urged the students to set goals and work hard to achieve them. Schaefer grew up with the Air Force as the son of an Airman. He reminisced about seeing jets flying and asking, "There's people that get paid to do that? How do I do that?"

He said it was about middle school when he decided he wanted to fly jets for a living.

"So how do I do that? Well, I have to go to college to be a pilot and the place where you are guaranteed to fly is the Air Force Academy."

Schaefer said he worked to complete all the requirements to get into the Air Force Academy. His father even drove him to the academy in Colorado to drop off his application in person to ensure it was received by the deadline.

The general also spoke about a 28-year-old Air Force master sergeant and single father that he helped become a pilot. He explained that there's a lot a person has to do to become a pilot including going to Air Force Officer Training School and then flight training. After doing all that and overcoming a few

obstacles, the former master sergeant later contacted Schaefer as a new lieutenant and pilot.

"If you find something you're passionate about and it becomes a career, you'll never work a day in your life," Schaefer said.

According to the Lancaster School District, the Fulton and Alsbury Academy of Arts and Engineering is named after famed Air Force and NASA test pilot Fitz Fulton and Scaled Composites pilot Mike Alsbury who died in October 2014 in the crash of SpaceShipTwo. The year-old middle school is dedicated to students interested in rigorous and relevant studies in arts and engineering.

This Week in Edwards History

On June 5, 1948, Northrop's YB-49 No. 2, a prototype flying wing jet bomber, went out of control during its 25th test flight and crashed about 10 miles northwest of Muroc Air Force Base. Three officers and two civilian aircrew were killed. The pilot was Maj. Daniel Forbes Jr. and the copilot was Capt. Glen Edwards. The aircraft was testing stall recovery performance when it suffered a catastrophic structural failure with the outer wing panels tearing off. In December 1949, Muroc was renamed Edwards Air Force Base in honor of Capt. Edwards. (Edwards History Office file photo)
