The 412th Test Wing's command chief master sergeant has been called to another assignment after just 13 months in his position at Edwards.

Chief Master Sgt. Todd Simmons took the position of command chief here in May, 2016, becoming the principal advisor to the 412th TW commander on matters concerning morale, welfare, discipline, training, fitness and effective utilization

of the wing's 14,000 military, civilian, contractor personnel and their families.

Now Simmons has been charged with taking a similar role as command chief at Air University, headquartered at Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama. Air University is a key component of Air Education and Training Command, and is the Air Force's center for professional military education.

"I had the opportunity to interview for the position with Lt. Gen. (Steven Kwast, Air University commander and president) and was selected a week and a half later," Simmons said. "I wasn't expecting it to move this quickly at all, but Air Force needs come first. As the Air Force goes down the road of perfecting, changing and modernizing enlisted and officer professional military education, I am excited to be part of that."

As he prepares to transition to his new assignment, Simmons said one of his best memories of Edwards is the excitement of becoming a better team.

"Working together can net some amazing results," he said. "Building a team of folks and inspiring them to do the right thing – and to take those things that mean a lot to them forward – that's been my biggest goal. From the enlisted Airmen, the officers and civilians, to our spouses and our families, we've treated this as a community, as a place that we want to live in and want to make better. And we have made it better. We've promoted heritage, we've promoted education here, professional military education, pride of family, and

Jeff Babione, Lockheed Martin F-35 executive vice president and general manager, visited the Joint Strike Fighter Integrated Test Force July 20 and hosted an all hands event in one of the ITF's hangars.

Babione praised the ITF's important achievement of carrying out the system development and demonstration phase of the F-35 program to its upcoming completion.

"The work [the ITF members] are doing, alongside everyone else on the SDD program, to finish strong is outstanding. While the team is well on their way to closing out SDD, they still have a number of mission critical tests to complete and there is no doubt in my mind that they will finish strong," said Babione.

Joining Babione on stage for the all hands were J.D. McFarlan, Lockheed Martin vice president of F-35 test and verification; Mike Glass, Lockheed Martin director of the Edwards ITF; and Fred Ross, LM vice president of program management. They discussed the importance of crossing the finish line on the SDD program, while also recognizing five employees for exemplary performance.

"Finishing SDD is a major milestone in this 16-year pro-


In 2002, then Secretary of the Air Force, Dr. James Roche, championed an initiative to open Air Force Institute of Technology's Graduate School of Engineering and Management to senior enlisted personnel. Secretary Roche truly believed in the importance of the enlisted force to military achievements in science and technology. Two years later, eight Air Force and six Marine Corps senior NCOs received master's degrees from AFIT. To date, more than 100 certificates, master's, and doctoral degrees have been awarded to enlisted personnel. Just recently, AFIT alumnus Senior Master Sgt. Jason Russi was awarded a U.S. patent for work done while a graduate student at AFIT on "Stereoscopic 3-D Presentation for Air Traffic Control Digital Displays."

The Enlisted-to-AFIT program provides enhanced combat capability for diverse career fields with positions requiring a higher degree of education.

Master Sgt. Ronald Mitchell earned a master's degree in materials science from AFIT in 2017. He is currently working as a project engineer at the National Air and Space Intelligence Center at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio.

Mitchell shared, "Almost immediately I began seeing the benefits of my advanced degree to the Air Force, to my career field and with the enlisted members I was stationed with. My leadership empowered me, my senior scientists supported me and my peers welcomed me."

Master Sgt. Theodore Holliger, a current AFIT master's student working towards a degree in logistics and supply chain management, stated, "AFIT teaches you to think critically. I don't know where my education will take me, but I do know that no matter where I go, I will be prepared to offer solutions that are viable and defensible to leadership."

we've promoted our joint partners by partnering more with our Navy, Marine and coalition partners.

The chief said he had many great memories here and his only disappointment, however slight, was leaving unfinished business.

"I wasn't here long enough to see my two-year vision and General Schaefer's vision come to completion, to see the end of things that are going so well," Simmons said. "It's not that

Airmen interested in applying for the 18 to 24-month program must at least be selected for a promotion to technical sergeant with a minimum of eight years time in service, 24 months time on station, have completed their seven skill-level upgrade and possess a bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited college or university and a Community College of the Air Force degree. In addition to academic transcripts, applicants have to provide test scores from either the Graduate Record Examination or Graduate Management Admission Test, depending upon the specific degree-program requirements. Airmen will incur a three year active duty service commitment upon graduation.

Personnel apply to AFIT based on the Enlisted-to-AFIT Call for Nominations sent out in November each year. Selections are released in the spring.

"Hopefully the people who work here hold belief that they have a special mission that will never be repeated anywhere else they go in their Air Force career and that they hold the pride that we're putting out air power that will last generations."

"Thank you to all those who served here," he said. "This will be the highlight of my career, serving at Edwards Air Force Base. I have absolutely enjoyed this job – I've enjoyed everything about this place. There's some sadness to go, but I know I'll take the things I've learned here and apply them to my future responsibilities of educating the Air Force."

Military members receiving 1408s are subject to Uniform Code of Military Justice action. A U.S. District Court Violation Notice (USDCVN) (a fine) is issued to all civilians, dependents and retirees. If issued a USDCVN, violators may be required to be present at Magistrate Court in Bakersfield, California, receive traffic violation points against their state-issued driver's license and potentially receive suspension of on-base driving privileges.

2,000 points earned and the rewards card can be redeemed anywhere Exchange gift cards are accepted.



As the Department of Defense's military exchange services prepare to welcome potentially 13 million honorably discharged veterans back to their military families this coming Veteran's Day, www.VetVerify.org has launched to confirm eligibility to receive lifelong military exchange online shopping.

Veterans may log onto www.VetVerify.org, which will use information from the DOD's Defense Manpower Data Center's records and inform them of their ability to access this new benefit. If a veteran's record has character of service data and that data meets the criteria for the online benefit, the veteran will be verified to shop. Then, beginning Nov. 11, the veteran can log onto to the Air Force, Army, Coast Guard, Marine Corps and Navy Exchange websites at www.shop-myexchange.com, www.mymex.com, and www.mynavyexchange.com, for tax-free shopping. If a veteran's information is incomplete, www.VetVerify.org will provide guidance on next steps.
