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Total Force effort brings improvements to Edwards

More than 80 Airmen from across the nation joined the 412th Civil Engineer Squadron to complete three large construction projects at Edwards.

The projects allowed the Airmen, mostly from Air Force Reserve Command and Air National Guard, to get hands-on training during their annual two-week-long drill while the 412th CES provided expertise and equipment.

The results are newly paved parking lots for Club Muroc, an underground drainage system by base housing, new gaskets installed in hangars and renovations to Bldg. 4906.

Senior Master Sgt. Rebeca Forgey, 446th Civil Engineer Squadron, Washington, was the project manager. She met Murray Westley, 412th CEG director, while she was attending an Airman Leadership School graduation here for one of her troops. After a short talk, her squadron got ready to take on the mission.

"Our squadron came for a site visit to make sure we knew what's going on, meet the people, make sure we hit the ground with good morale," said Forgey. "There were other teams within AFRC that were picked to come out here and work different times of the year to do these jobs, but it was

kind of spread out and we found out [412th Civil Engineer Squadron] really wanted Club Muroc's parking lot done and the only way to do that was to combine all the teams together, so we put out an AFRC-wide call."

Forgey called AFRC headquarters and said the Edwards project was a much larger scope than her squadron could provide and asked for volunteers, who stepped up right away.

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Blake becomes new commandant at test pilot school

Col. Ryan Blake took the helm as the new commandant of the U.S. Air Force Test Pilot School during a change of command ceremony held in Hangar 1207 July 10.

As commandant of TPS, Blake will drive the school's strategic vision, set organizational objectives and direct a \$32.5 million budget overseeing the day-to-day operations of the world's premier test pilot school.

Blake graduated from TPS in December 2008 and is both a seasoned combat pilot and test pilot. He previously served as the 96th Operations Group commander at Eglin Air Force Base, Florida, and before that was a test pilot and flight test squadron commander. He is a command pilot with more than 2,400 military flight hours in 44 aircraft types as an experimental test pilot, instructor pilot and evaluator pilot.

"When you look at the wall (of former commandants) in the schoolhouse, you see household names like Chuck Yeager and Buzz Aldrin...to be selected as the new commandant is very humbling," Blake said.

Col. Matthew Higer, who served as commandant for the past year, is moving on to become a wing commander at another base.

Since 1951, the school at Edwards AFB is where the Air Force's top pilots, navigators and engineers learn how to conduct flight test and generate the data needed to carry out test

missions. Human lives and millions of dollars depend upon how carefully a test mission is planned and flown. The comprehensive, one-year curriculum of TPS is fundamental to the success of flight test and evaluation, according to the school. Upon graduating from TPS, graduates receive a Master of Science Degree in Flight Test Engineering.

"You are the enabler of combat capability for our nation and our allies," said Brig. Gen. Carl Schaefer, 412th Test Wing commander, who presided over the ceremony. "You prepare our finest officers and civilians to conduct and support elevated-risk flight test every day to ensure Air Force, joint, coalition, mission success across the globe. You are the producer of astronauts and leaders in our Air Force, Navy and numerous countries."

DOD: Transfer of Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits changes

The Defense Department issued a substantive change July 12 to its policy on the transfer by service members in the uniformed services of Post-9/11 GI Bill educational benefits to eligible family member recipients.

Effective one year from the date of this change, eligibility to transfer those benefits will be limited to service members with less than 16 years of total active-duty or selected reserve service, as applicable.

Previously, there were no restrictions on when a service member could transfer educational benefits to their family members. The provision that requires a service member to have at least six years of service to apply to transfer benefits remains unchanged in the policy.

"After a thorough review of the policy, we saw a need to focus on retention in a time of increased growth of the armed forces," said Stephanie Miller, director of accessions policy in the Office of the

Secretary of Defense. "This change continues to allow career service members that earned this benefit to share it with their family members while they continue to serve." This change is an important step to preserve the distinction of transferability as a retention incentive, she added.

service obligation because of a "force shaping" event -- such as officers involuntarily separated as a result of being twice passed over for promotion or enlisted personnel involuntarily separated as a result of failure to meet minimum retention standards, such as high year of tenure -- the change will allow them to retain their eligibility to transfer education benefits even if they haven't served the entirety of their obligated service commitment through no fault of their own.

All approvals for transferability of Post-9/11 GI bill continue to require a four-year commitment in the armed forces and, more importantly, the member must be eligible to be retained for four years from the date of election, officials said.

The policy affects service members in the uniformed services, which includes the U.S. Coast Guard as well as the commissioned members of the U.S. Public Health Service and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

If service members fail to fulfill their

She added that 81 civil engineer Airmen is a lot to have at one time, but because Edwards is large and the projects were spread out, they managed to get a lot done in a small amount of time.

In addition to repaying the parking lots at Club Muroc, the CE Airmen also relocated an electrical line underground beneath the main parking lot.

The underground drainage system project took place near Kincheloe Ave. by base housing.

"The (previous) open drainage had lots of issues with it filling up with debris and causing backfill and flooding so we cleared it out and put in 27-inch piping and then covered it so it will be underground. It should help with the debris build-up in there," Forgey said.

Another team worked on renovating 412th Civil Engineer Group's Bldg. 4906 where they did reframing of office spaces and walls, electrical work and all the plumbing was completely renovated, according to Forgey.

In total, eight Air Force civil engineer squadrons banded together with Edwards CE personnel to complete the projects in two weeks. The units involved were:
